

The Jefferson County Landmarks Commission met on Monday, November 24, 1975 at 10:00 a.m. in the offices of the Jefferson County Planning Commission. Those present were Miss Emily Stanley, Mrs. Leeds K. Riely, Dr. John Washington, Capt. John Schley and Mr. Archie Franzen.

Dr. Washington presented two lists, one of pre-revolutionary places and their status and one of roadside markers as to whether they were in place or on order.

It was agreed to present the owners of the Manor House, General Darke Site and The Stone House at Rock Hall with certificates. It was further agreed to present both a certificate and a plaque to the owners of the Peter Burr House and Morgan's Spring.

Capt. Schley made a motion to have the George Washington Masonic Cave placed on the Jefferson County Landmarks Commission's Register. Miss Stanley seconded the motion and all members concurred. The owner is to receive a certificate but because of the likelihood of vandalism no plaque will be placed at the site.

A discussion was held regarding the criteria for selecting additional homes for landmark status now that the majority of pre-revolutionary homes have been accorded landmark status.

It was suggested that houses on the National Register that have not received county landmark status be processed next.

It was felt that three houses a month should be visited and processed and that all magisterial be represented.
